F-Class, F/TR and G-Class Match Details 60 Round Match

Entry Fee \$20

- Awards: 1st, 2nd, and 3rd for each class
- In the event of match day rain all competitors will shoot under the roof, off the concrete
- In the event of lightning the match will be delayed 20 after last close strike

Course of Fire

Up to 75+ Rounds shot for the match

- It is advised to bring a few extra in the event of E Target malfunction

Up to 15 Sighters for the match

60 rounds for Record for the match

3 Relays

25 min per Relay

No more than 5 sighters per relay

20 Shots for Record per relay - Once shooting for record, no more sighters allowed

Classes

F-Open NRA Sanctioned per NRA F-Class Rules NRACS-01 2024

- Shot Prone
- Bore diameter no greater than 35 cal
- Rifle weight less than 10kg (approx 22lbs)
- Fired from detached front rest or bipod

F/TR NRA Sanctioned per NRA F-Class Rules NRACS-01 2024

- Shot Prone
- Unmodified Chamber .308 Win/7.62NATO or .223 Rem/5.56x45 NATO
- Rifle must be fired off an attached bipod
- Rifle overall weight including all attachments is less than 8.25kg (18.18lbs)

G-Class Non Sanctioned Club Match

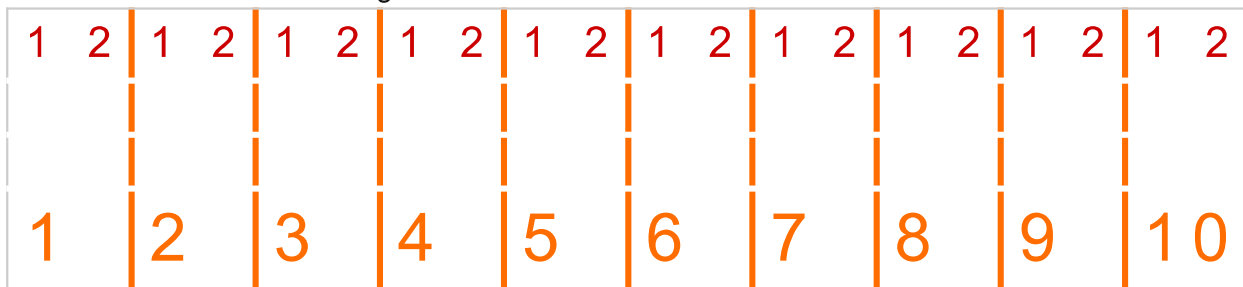
- Shot from bench rest
- Basic idea is F-Open from a bench
- Non-Sanctioned Class, so basically anything goes

Important Notes:

1. If ShotMarker Target doesn't register a shot for record you must fire another round for record. **Bring more than 75 rounds!**
2. Muzzle Brakes, Compensators, Flash Hiders, and Suppressors are prohibited
3. Rifles may only be loaded with one cartridge at a time
 - a. Magazines may be used, but only one cartridge may be loaded at a time
4. Semi automatic rifles are allowed; brass catchers are highly encouraged
5. Shotmarker Connection:
 - a. Connect phone/tablet to ShotMarker Wifi Signal
 - b. Search 192.168.100.1 in web browser

F-CLASS Safety Briefing with Shot Marker Targets

1. Disruptive behavior will not be tolerated.
2. There is an outhouse. Full bathrooms in the Club House
3. There will be no smoking or vaping forward of the North edge of the canopy.
4. Leave space for people to walk behind the firing line.
5. Keep conversations away from the firing line during live fire and avoid loud speech.
6. Anyone can call a cease-fire for any safety issue. If a cease-fire is called:
 - a. Each shooter shall relay the cease-fire command loudly to other shooters and insert an Empty Chamber Indicator (ECI) in all rifles.
 - b. Wait for instructions from the Range Officer.
7. Rifles are not allowed on the firing line unless the pits are sealed.
 - a. The pits are unmanned during live fire. They will only be unsealed between relays to repair targets.
8. Rifles shall be pointed up or down range with an ECI in place, when being handled and moved around the range.
9. Empty Chamber Indicator (ECI) may only be removed during the 3 minute prep period and live fire.
10. The rifle must be pointed at the impact berm when the bolt is closed.
11. If you plan on making repairs or adjustments to your rifle or equipment, you must first remove the rifle from the line with the ECI inserted before proceeding. Be respectful of the other competitors around you.
12. There should never be an uncased rifle without an ECI. It is the responsibility of the competitor and the scorekeeper to make sure the ECI is inserted at the end of firing.
13. Prior to bringing your rifle to the firing line there will be time given to move all of your shooting equipment to the firing line if you haven't already done so.
14. There is enough room in each shooting lane for 2 shooters to leave their shooting equipment in the shooting lane.
 - a. 1st Relay Shooters put your equipment on the left side of the lane
 - b. 2nd Relay Shooters put your equipment on the right side of the lane.
 - c. There is a diagram of the lanes for reference



15. After the command “move all of your shooting equipment to the firing line” all shooters from all relays will be allowed to bring their shooting equipment(rests, mats, bags, spotting scopes, etc.)
16. After the command “move your rifle to the firing line” has been given, you may handle your rifle. The ECI must remain in the rifle and magazines or sleds cannot be inserted until the start of prep time.

Course of Fire

1. Shooters move your shooting equipment to the firing line.
2. Shooters move your rifle to the firing line.
3. 3 minute prep period.
 - a. ECI may be removed and dry firing may commence.
4. 25 minute up to 5 sighters and 20 shots for record
5. Make sure to set your target to shoot for record, the shooter may instruct the scorer to do this for them.

Rules

1. Scoring:
 - a. Relay 2 scores for Relay 1, Relay 3 for 2, Relay 1 for 3, etc.
 - b. In the event of uneven relays find a volunteer scorer or ask the Match Director to find an extra scorer.
2. There is a 7 second delay to simulate F-Class pit service.
 - a. If the target is shot too fast, within the 7 second delay, Shotmarker may show your hit and your score, but won't register your shot in the scoring area.
 - b. If the shot does not register in the scoring area, because the target was shot too quickly, another shot must be fired to register a score in the scoring area.
3. Competitors shall have 20 shots for record registered in the Shotmarker Scoring Area in the upper right hand corner of the screen.
4. In the event your E Target is disabled, you may be directed to move to a different firing point.
 - a. At least one extra lane shall be reserved for "Hospital"
 - b. Once moved 2 sighters and additional time is allowed to the shooter.
5. Everyone is welcome to watch the current relay shoot on their phones, tablets, or club tablets.
 - a. As a spectator be extremely careful not to touch the "Begin Record" or the "Notepad with and Pencil" icon in the upper right hand corner of the screen.
 - b. The Match Director is not responsible for what happens to the spectator if they mess up the scoring!!
